
over the ΑII Dem friends, world, through all ages human history every generation has far more in common with those who went before than they might suspect. Even with all the scientific and cultural achievements of our times we are not very much removed from ancestors. On the most basic level

It is the last of these shared experiences I wish to look at today. Some of us die slowly, "chipping away" at life, until there is nothing left; others check out abruptly - with a sudden heart attack or accident. Some do it when they are old and others do it when they are young.

and we will all die.

Most people in the world are afraid of dying, which is not, perhaps, an irrational fear. Unfortunately, a lot of people are SO afraid of dying that they do not even want to discuss death, which, uncomfortable as this may be, is actually discussion irresponsible — and for a Christian unacceptable.

God is aware of everything, including this great fear we human beings have. But he has given us certain assurances, which he expects those who believe in Him to take at face value, namely, that death isn't in fact, of itself, something to be feared. We may pour out prayer to God to give us a peaceful and quiet passing, and I think it only natural that we might have apprehension about the manner and cause of our death. But the only reason to fear death is if we are living without hope.



our Lectionary, that Holy Scriptures, has been written for our learning and comfort and, most especially, to give us hope, in God's promise that His words shall not pass away.

The Church's ministry of the word is the means which the God of hope uses to fill the faithful with all joy and peace in believing.

The ministry of preaching is much emphasised today. But what does it accomplish? I find that often the Liturgy and the Offices and the seasonal devotions of the Church are far more interesting impressive and illuminating than sermons. I believe that as important preaching is, many people are won and taught their faith by the Liturgy rather than by sermons. This is true, I think, all over the world. Wherever you find a cathedral, a church or a chapel in which the priests make it their chief concern to serve God unfailingly at the Altar and in Choir, you will find a The Church speaks to us today in people rooted and grounded in faith.

This Christmas we will confine our Christmas Services to the Mass on Christmas Eve.

The reason is not hard to see. At the Altar, in Choir, at the Lectern, it is the Church's voice that you hear. The priest speaks the words of the Church and not his own. His individuality is happily lost. He is caught up into and he is merged with the Church.

The Altar is the main focus. The mystery there is the mystery of Calvary. The Church there shows forth the Lord's death till He comes.

At the Mass, and happily in our Liturgy which has retained the fullness of Liturgical life, from the preparation at the foot of the Altar and on through Introit. Kyrie, Gloria, Collect, Epistle, Gospel, Creed, Sanctus, Benedictus, Consecration, Agnus, Communion, , Post Communion, Blessing and Last Gospel, you will find redemption in action from Bethlehem to Heaven.

In the Daily Offices in Psalms and Lessons, the Bible from beginning to end is proclaimed. And this every day throughout the year.

In the Seasonal Devotions, you will find the Sacred Drama which literally makes every year a year of Our Lord.

It is impossible to follow the Church from Advent to Advent without a growing knowledge of the holy Word AND with that knowledge comes a sure and certain hope. An end to despair, worry and fear. BUT we have a part to play here in bringing this hope to a dark and lonely world. We must LIVE in the Christian Hope. This Christian Hope isn't wishful thinking, dilly day dreams or what we wish with fingers crossed might happen. Human hope is like that ... frivolous, shallow and silly. God doesn't break His word, forget His promises, disappoint, let down or change His mind.

Christian Hope in the second coming of Christ, the second Advent of our Lord in all His glory when all will see Him re-

vealed, is a certainty! It is in that certainty in which we should and MUST live!
