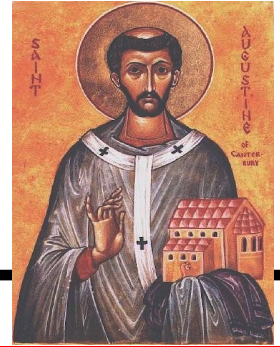

Dear Friends,

I hope and pray this weeks newsletter finds you safe and well. Whether you are in Church, in your own home, or standing outside the Church reading it on our notice board.

I am very grateful to Fr Raymond Thompson for celebrating Mass last Sunday at short notice after my back injury. I am pleased to say that my back is much better. Unfortunately, I will not be in Church today either. However, this time it is because I have been exposed to someone close to me who has tested positive for Covid-19. I am therefore required to isolate and, because of my serious pre-existing medical conditions, am awaiting the results of a Coronavirus test. Praise God I am not experiencing any symptoms at the moment, but I pray for those who have been in contact with me who are suffering from the virus, although also praise God, their symptoms do not appear serious at the moment. I hope to be out of quarantine and back at the altar in time for our Mass at 6pm on Christmas Eve and for the carol singing after Mass on the Church forecourt.

On Christmas Day, as for over 2000 years, the Gospel will proclaim the Good News of great joy which shall be to all people. From all the Altars and Pulpits of Christendom, from our little Church, from the mighty Cathedral in Canterbury, from St Peter's Basilica in Rome, from the secret places around the world where Christians are persecuted, the central and supreme mystery will be announced. "The Word was made flesh, and dwelt among us." At that announcement every Christian knee will bow in humble gratitude for this first and most precious Christmas gift of Almighty God.

This Christmas will be a strange celebration. Some families will not be able to come together. Some will be mourning the loss of loved ones, while others will be confused and distressed. Those who always work through the holiday, in the uniformed and armed forces, our doctors, nurses and care home workers will do so with the extra stress and the burden of their wonderful sacrificial work and service to each other

Christmas, over the years, has become for most of us a cosy and positive experience. The joy of seeing loved ones, of enjoying gifts and, perhaps, drinking and eating a little more than we should.
