Please Turn off Your Mobile Phones Today, the Fifth Sunday after Easter, is also commonly called Rogation Sunday. It is the day when the Church has traditionally offered prayer for God's blessing on the fruits of the earth and the labour of those who produce our food.

The word "rogation" is from the Latin *rogare*, or *to ask*. Historically, the Rogation Days (the three days before Ascension Day) were a period of fasting and abstinence, beseeching God's blessing on the crops for a bountiful harvest.

Few of us today directly derive our livelihood from the production of food, yet it is good to be reminded of our dependence upon those who do and our responsibility for the environment.

Asking God for blessings and other things is often time misunderstood. A little like the belief that when people die they become Angels or that if you become a Christian you'll somehow be magically protected against suffering!

I have over the years encountered many arguments and excuses people use for not seriously engaging with God and one of the lightweight excuses is the statement "I prayed for x, y or z and God ignored me and so I don't believe in him".

True if the x, y or z was a loved one who was in serious pain or suffering, then I can perhaps understand why disappointment may turn to resentment and even unbelief might follow. But, if it were, as has sometime been the case, "I didn't get that new job I



wanted" or "I didn't win the lottery" it is very silly really.

So is it true that God has given us a 'blank cheque' to ask anything of Him just as one might ask a genie in a fairy-tale? Some seem to misunderstand this to be the case, but I John 5:14 qualifies what He will grant: "And this is the confidence that we have in him, that, if we ask any thing according to his will, he heareth us."

What we need is for God to fill our minds and hearts with His thoughts. Then His desires will become our desires flowing back to Him in the form of prayer. James 4:3 confirms this: "Ye ask, and receive not, because ye ask amiss, that ye may consume it upon your lusts." If we ask amiss, we are certainly not asking according to His will, and we will not receive. Jesus says in John 16:23 "Verily, verily, I say unto you, Whatsoever ye shall ask the Father in my name, he will give it you." AND this is what He most assuredly does, but we

still do not have it carte blanche.

To ask God for anything in the name of Jesus Christ, it must be in keeping with what He is. To ask in Christ's name is to ask as though Christ Himself were asking. Therefore, we can only ask for what Christ Himself would ask. It is therefore necessary to set aside our own will and accept God's. Jesus says in John 8:29: "And he that sent me is with me: the Father hath not left me alone; for I do always those things that please him."

If we do as Jesus did, we are sure to receive answers as He did. He says in John 11:41-42: "And Jesus lifted up his eyes, and said, Father, I thank thee that thou hast heard me. And I knew that thou hearest me always:"

We must come away with the realisation that prayer is not dictating to God, but a humble and heartfelt expression of our attitude

of dependency and need. Because of this, the one who truly prays is submissive to God's will, content with Him supplying his need according to the dictates of His sovereign pleasure.

The result of this, combined with the infusion of God's attitudes and thoughts as we draw near to Him, will work to create us in His image.
