
Dews friends, who is concerned about fragments!

In today's Gospel reading we hear something rather remarkable. Our Lord does something interesting in verse 12. He commands his disciples to gather the fragments that remain of the loaves and fishes that he has used to miraculously feed the multitude, that nothing be lost.-Jesus was concerned about the leftovers!!

Now some have used this verse to teach us to be good stewards of what God gives us and not waste it. That is certainly true. But there is something else that speaks to us from this verse of scripture. God was interested in the small things, the little things. He valued those things we could so easily overlook, forget, reject, cast aside. Is it not true that we are oftentimes guilty of doing that with other things in our lives? Overlooking the small achievements, the smiles, the encouraging word, the moment of joy, of tenderness that can sometimes be overwhelmed. Sometimes we can overlook the moments of also despair, of loneliness, of doubt and sorrow. If not our own — then those of others.

Think about Jesus wanting all those fragments, those leftovers, those things that no one in the crowd wanted any more, and He gathered them for a purpose. What was His purpose in gathering these leftovers? He was going to use them. We serve a God who is concerned about the fragments of our lives.

It has been my privilege over the years to be with people in the last days, hours and sometimes minutes of their lives. Some of them have confided in me that there have been periods in their lives when they have been separated from God, perhaps they have done something wrong that




they feel is unforgivable and have taken themselves out into the wilderness. Or perhaps they have only seriously started considering Christianity when the shadows are darkening in their lives-and they realise they haven't paid attention to their spiritual wellbeing. Maybe they may have been conscious they have made wrong decisions. Sometimes they have felt that they have made a mess out of their life. That life hasn't gone the way they wanted it too and so many of their dreams have not been realised.

When we encounter God, pretty early on we will be Baptised and later still encounter the passage in Scripture *"If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness."* (1 John 1:9). All of this speaks strongly of how God wants to respond to all the things that have troubled us in life. To forgive us because He loves us.

However, it is very tempting for people in that last period of their lives (Even, sometimes, committed Christians — Who have been forgiven) not to really believe it, because they are assailed by doubts, perhaps living in a place of despair, defeat, and Parish News

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


forever being beat down by their past. That is, of course, exactly where the devil wants them to stay.

The disciples felt like this immediately after the Crucifixion of Jesus. Despite having Jesus Himself; with them, teaching them, reassuring them, showing them. They were fearful, they were assailed by doubts.

At the beginning of our Lenten observance we were invited to journey towards Jerusalem with Jesus and his disciples. Perhaps we have been distracted on the way, maybe all the good intentions we had to keep lent aright this year and to use the time to preapore and draw closer to God hasn't happened as we intended. Today in the midst of Lent we have а Refreshment Sunday, when the rigours of Lent may be relaxed a little. Maybe we will spare some time today to ponder on the reason we are going up to Jerusalem?

The heavenly Jerusalem is our ultimate destination as Christians. Jesus has promised us that it is there, our true home, when we will live with him forever. Whatever has happened in our lives, God wants to gather up the fragments ... that ... nothing be lost. For we are living in the shadow of
